MARKSMAN'S NEW EDITOR

So, who is taking over the editing and production of our newsletter in 2017?

The suggestion came from the Provident Fund's John Else. When John was studying the French language at West Nottinghamshire College over a decade ago, he became acquainted with a fellow student, who happened to be a full-time author, journalist and freelance writer. Eventually, **Roy Bainton** was commissioned to write *The Alternative Mansfield Brew*, the 2006 book which told the story of Mansfield Brewery. John and Roy have enjoyed a close friendship ever since.



Roy Bainton was born in 1943 and raised in Hull, and spent the early years of his working life in the Merchant Navy. After a long career spanning 32 different occupations, from manual work to sales and marketing, what had been his constant part time occupation, writing, became full time in 1997. Since then he's had 18 books published, and over the past 45 years had many features and articles in numerous magazines and newspapers, as well as work for BBC Radio 4 and Sky TV. His work includes history, music, poetry and fiction. He has been a

columnist for the Mansfield *Chad* newspaper, and is well known at Mansfield District Council for his work in the community, producing quarterly newsletters for various housing estates in Ravensdale, Oak Tree Lane, Pleasley and especially on Bellamy

Road, where his regular publication *The Bellamy Bugle* is in its 11th year. Roy also spent 18 years as Chairman of the West Hill Residents' Association, and led their



successful fight for the demolition of the derelict Mansfield General Hospital. This culminated in the buy-out of the site from the stubborn owner with demolition taking place in April 2015. The site is now being developed as social housing for the over-50s.

Roy is a member of the National Union of Journalists, the Society of Authors, and is a Fellow of the Royal Literary Fund and President of the Nottingham Writer's Club, which celebrates its 90th anniversary in 2017.

BAILY THOMAS CHARITABLE FUND NOVEMBER 2016

The Baily Thomas Charitable Fund was set up on behalf of Frank Baily Thomas, for whom the Baily Thomas Provident Fund was also established, both Funds being created on 2 October 1970. The Charitable Fund is a major benefactor of the Provident Fund as per the intention of the original Settlement Deeds in 1970, and when the Provident Fund ends in 2050 the residuary funds will pass to the Charitable Fund.

The aim of the Baily Thomas Charitable Fund was to award grants for the prevention, treatment or relief of mental or other forms of illness. Since 2001 the priority has been solely for the provision for the benefit of persons with severe learning disabilities (intellectual disabilities), including Autism.

The Charitable Fund achieves this objective by funding research into learning disabilities, and awarding grants to projects for the benefit of the learning disabled. These grants could cover capital costs of setting up projects or the revenue costs of running such projects, for instance through staff funding or equipment costs. The Fund has recently launched a Doctoral Fellowship scheme, this aims to support promising researchers to complete a PhD on a topic relevant to people with learning disabilities. From the inaugural round of applicants, one of the successful candidates is currently studying at The University of Nottingham, the PhD is an investigation into the role of attentional control in autism spectrum disorders.

The Charitable Fund receives a high volume of applications annually and with so many calls on its available funds, it is not possible to support all appeals and in the majority of cases not all appeals can be supported in full. For the year to 30 September 2016 the Fund awarded 338 grants for a total of £2,983,665 (2015 - £2,729,332).

There is a strong relationship between the Baily Thomas Charitable Fund Trustees and the Provident Fund Trustees and they meet regularly to discuss current matters.

Over the past 10 years the Charitable Fund has awarded grants totalling approximately £750,000 to the Nottingham postcode area. Of this £71,000 was given specifically within the Mansfield area and appeals supported ranged from core running costs of charities, the employment of Mentor Support Workers and persons with learning disabilities, the refurbishment of a community café and funding towards a sensory garden.




