King's Mill Reservoir, Sutton in Ashfield, Nottinghamshire

The story of water-powered mills on Mansfield's River Maun began in 1771. Many were textile mills and King's Mill Reservoir at Sutton-in-Ashfield was created to supply water power to one of these mills.

Today the reservoir attracts many species of waterfowl, including several breeding pairs of Great Crested Grebes, which in the spring display their courtship dance. A pair of rare Australian Black Swans produced a brood of cygnets here.

FROM CORNWALL BACK TO MANSFIELD

I joined Mansfield Brewery in March 1973 as secretary to the Sales Director, Peter Watson, who was well known for his biting temper. For the first three months I went home in tears

every day, but then shouted back at him and from that moment he treated me with respect! I heard that people took bets on how long I would stay. As it turned out I stayed for twenty three and a half years, retiring on 31st October 1996.

It was Halloween and I gave my farewell speech wearing a witch's hat and was treated to a very nice male stripper. Some of the girls presented me with a plaque which I keep to this day hanging on my wall.

During my time at the brewery I also worked for Richard Umbers who took over from Peter Watson, helping to sift through the many applications for people who wanted a pub tenancy. I was lucky to be invited to many new pub openings and also to shows at the Aquarius nightclub in Chesterfield.

After eight years in the Sales department I moved up a floor in the new office block and became secretary to Mark Phillips, the Company Secretary. Shortly after that Richard Chadburn took

COLIN SLANEY CREATES

Colin Slaney worked in the Brewery Estates Department until closure. A committed countryman he is invited on many estate shoots as a beater. Through this association with

open air pursuits he became interested in making handmade walking sticks.

The sticks are essential for moving on uneven ground to help keep balance and gain leverage on

inclines. It is of supreme importance to find the right

wood of uniform strength, width, length and weight.

Colin's guideline is to get the right type of wood which is then left to mature for 6 to 12 months, strip off the bark then sand paper and varnish it.

A collection of different bird feathers is the key to the

design. A number of grooves are made in the stick and the feathers are varnished into place.





The handles can be part of the stick or made from deer antler which is adapted with a screwed thread and inserted into the top the stick.

The overall effect of

the walking stick is a professional finish, which is both appealing, and useful.





Colin's other creative pastime is to diamond sketch an image onto a mirror or glass. When a subject is selected he etches the glass with a diamond tip spatula to create the finished picture, as illustrated in the photograph on the left.

Reginald Skidmore

1928 - 2013

Reginald Skidmore was a stocktaker at Mansfield Brewery in the Managed Houses department. When Mansfield Inns was established he moved over to the tenanted trade and his remit extended to stocktake at free trade clubs when requested.

Mansfield became the first brewery in the country to use stock checking hand-held computers and Reg mastered this new system in his usual professional way. Reg's wife predeceased him and he leaves a son and his family.

Phyllis Margaret Storr 1933-2014

Phyllis Storr (known to all as Phyll) started work at the Brewery as a secretary in the early 1970's and worked there until her retirement in 1990. Her last position was that of secretary to Hugh Wilson, Director of the Properties Department.

Phyll leaves husband Jack, daughter Karen and son-in-law Mike.

Gordon Hill 1928 - 2014

Gordon Hill was born in Grimsby. His parents moved around when he was a child and



he completed his education at Rosehill Prep school in Tunbridge Wells. On leaving school in 1946 he joined the RAF and was stationed at Fanara in Egypt. In 1950 he was invalided out with poliomyelitis.

He secured a position with the Royal Berkshire Water Company and his sales area was around Cheltenham. Nine months later he joined Schweppes and was then invited to become Sales Director of a

Liverpool soft drinks company which he later bought. He later sold the business and emigrated to Australia where he set up a soft drinks business in Brisbane. He returned to England on the death of his father and joined Coca Cola as the company's National Accounts Sales Manager and some three years later he joined J. Lyons as Sunfresh Carbonates Manager.

In 1966 he joined Beechams as their own label Soft Drinks Manager. In 1970 he joined T.W. Beach and Sons (later Mandora) as their London sales rep and later became General Sales Manager. T.W. Beach became part of the Mansfield Brewery group in October 1980 and six months later Gordon was made Sales Director.

Gordon married his wife Sally in Northwood Middlesex and later had two sons Graham and Christopher.

WASHINGTON MONUMENT AND LINCOLN MEMORIAL


Bob and Sue Longden recently returned from a holiday in America.


Hull QED Team Leaders 1994

GOODBYE TO THE WESTFIELD HOTEL



In 1895 a new communications device was installed in Mansfield by the National Telephone Company and there were 22 subscribers in the Mansfield area.

It is documented that W.J.Chadburn (Brewery Chairman at the time) was most reluctant to use it. When it rang he would instruct someone else to answer the instrument.

In the same year Mansfield Brewery acquired The Westfield Hotel on Westfield Lane, Mansfield, for £1,967. A popular local pub, the building was improved in 1965 but it, like many pubs, fell out of favour and in 2014 the building was sold. This Mansfield landmark has not been lost but turned into an attractive suite of offices for Bhatia Best Solicitors.
