Garden Birds in Winter

Feeding the birds visiting your garden can increase their chances of survival during the winter months. Some smaller birds require up to one third of their own body weight in food every day to exist.

Birds visiting our gardens include house sparrows, starlings, blackbirds, robins. tits thrushes, chaffinches to name a few. Each of these birds has its own preferred way of feeding - some prefer a hanging feeder, others a high bird table and some prefer to feed on the ground.

Daniel Turner

First Class Honours Degree in Philosophy, Politics and Economics



Daniel Turner has graduated with a first class degree from Balliol College, Oxford, where he studied Philosophy, Politics, and Economics. Balliol celebrated its 750th anniversary while Daniel was a student. Three UK prime ministers and five Nobel Prize winners, as well as the current Mayor of London, Boris Johnson, all studied at Balliol. While at Oxford, Daniel was elected by his peers to serve as the student president for a year. He is now moving to London to take up a job with the Home Office working on security issues. This is part of a four year training programme, offering a fast-track to the Senior Civil Service.

Throughout secondary school and university, Daniel received educational grants from the Baily Thomas Provident Fund. He finds it difficult to imagine he would be in the position he is in now, without this support from his parents' former workplace.

Daniel's parents are Tom Turner and Karen Hewkin. Tom worked as a drayman for Mansfield Brewery from 1997-2006, and Karen worked as an administrator for six years up to 2000. Both now work for Mansfield Anodisers on the Hermitage Lane industrial estate, Karen in the office and Tom on the shop floor

Bob Reeves Our Genial Landlord



Bob Reeves (known as Bubbly Bob) is the tenant of The Plough Inn at Farnsfield and has been with Mansfield and Marston's' breweries for 35 years.

His first pub on the Mansfield estate was in 1981, the Green Dragon at Oxton, and he moved to the Plough in

1997. He was initially interviewed by Austin O`Donoghue, Area Tenant Manager (right), Harry Ridley Wine and Spirits Manager, and John Bartle, Tenants Manager.



Bob has always been a community minded person and gets totally involved in village life and serves as a councillor on Farnsfield parish council. Quote from a recent report in the local paper on the village cricket match:-

"It was a dull day weather wise but there was some bowling in a very friendly atmosphere. The afternoon's bowling followed our regular Tuesday afternoon format - 30 bowlers taking part. After the bowling a buffet was provided, prepared by the ladies, from food supplied by our President, Bob Reeves (our genial landlord of The Plough). Bob also provided a barrel of beer and bottles of wine, both of which may have contributed in some way to the happy atmosphere throughout the afternoon"

While at The Green Dragon at Oxton, the village had no newsagents so Bob duly organised a shop. He would not let the paper boys and girls deliver out of the village so he would deliver papers to the surrounding area himself. It was on one of these occasions that a speeding car rammed his new car at the rear and he went through the windscreen.

Bob is a renowned chef in Farnsfield and the surrounding area and is helped by his wife June (whose homemade steak and kidney and meat and potato pies are famous) and this makes the Plough a very popular place to dine, lunchtime or evening. Nottingham Evening Post voted the



Plough the best pub for fish and chips in 2015 (fresh Grimsby fish is delivered twice weekly).

Bob's enthusiasm for his profession is a way of life and he joined many Mansfield Brewery trade activities. The Plough was built in 1724 and came into the Mansfield estate in 1955. It is a traditional country pub with a welcoming atmosphere and is open Monday to Saturday 11am to 12 pm and Sunday 12pm to 11pm.

Kenneth Widdowson Kinch 1926 - 2015



Ken was born 13th December 1926 at Edwinstowe to parents Horace and May Kinch. He spent his early childhood in Church Warsop and Warsop Vale, along with his younger brother Alan. Ken attended Warsop Vale School, his father a miner at Warsop Main colliery, sadly his mother died when Ken was only 16.

Ken started his working life as an errand boy in the offices at Warsop Main Colliery. Whist there he attended night school to achieve qualifications which resulted in him getting a job in the Sales department at Mansfield Brewery in June1946. He was later promoted to assistant company secretary and he remained there until he retired in1986 at the age of 60.

Ken played football and cricket for Mansfield Brewery at the sports ground at New Houghton

Ken met his wife Gwen at the Strand picture house in Warsop and they were married in 1948 at St Peter and St Paul church Warsop, a happy marriage which lasted 67 years. They received a congratulatory card from H.M. the Queen on their diamond anniversary. They have a daughter, Julia.

Ken had many pastimes and designed and oversaw the building of their family home. He enjoyed outings to the races, walks and picnics in Clumber Park, Rufford Abbey and Sherwood Forest. He enjoyed holidays mainly in the U.K. but a particularly fond memory was a trip to Florida, USA, with Julia and family. He enjoyed eating out and trying different restaurants but family events were always celebrated with Sunday lunch at the Van Dyke Hotel, Clowne. He enjoyed the Mansfield Brewery social club coach outings throughout the year with ex work colleagues.

Fred, as we all knew him, was a regular supporter of the annual Dinner and Dance and the Pensioners' meetings.




Robert Arthur Coker 1944 - 2015



Robert (Bob) started work with North Country Brewery in 1965 and worked in the Wine and Spirits Department Lambert Parker and Gaines. He continued his career as a drayman with Mansfield Brewery and was later promoted to transport foreman.

Bob was a well respected for his efforts and commitment to the brewery community. An active social committee member he organised outings to many attractions including Alton Towers. He also enjoyed arranging bowls and cricket matches, and other functions including popular Easter and Christmas dances which were often attended by the brewery directors. At the Mayor's annual parade in the 1980's the brewery entered a lorry titled the `Mississippi Show Boat float' which won first prize thanks to Bobs involvement.

Mike was born in the Shirebrook area and was one of two children of parents Fred and Doris. He attended Queen Elizabeth's School in Mansfield and enjoyed playing football and cricket for the school.

On leaving school Mike served a 5 year apprenticeship with Fenton's printers in Mansfield. His next job was in the printing division of Mansfield Hosiery Mills and he later moved to Goodwood Paper in Nottingham. In the 1970's Mike set up his own printing business, Rapier Press, in Somercotes

In the late 1950's Mike met and later married Brenda who was Pensions co-ordinator at Mansfield Brewery for many years. The couple have one daughter Alison who continues to run the family business.

One of Mike's greatest passions was motorbikes and motor racing. He was also very accomplished in woodwork and made many pieces of furniture. Mike liked to be out and about in the countryside and enjoyed long walks in the Lake District and the Derbyshire hills. For many years he was a member of the Mansfield Brewery Sunday walking group. He was a keen gardener and enjoyed holidays both at home and abroad. Mike leaves wife Brenda, daughter Alison and nieces and nephews.

Oakham Distribution Depot 21 Years Old



In 1994 the construction of the £3.5million Distribution Centre was on schedule.

It was vital at the time for the Brewery's continued expansion and it gave Mansfield a warehousing system that rivals the best in the country. The warehouse replaced four stores at the Littleworth site which had become increasingly congested.

The warehouse development was completed in September 1995 and dominated a commanding eight-acre site. The 5,100 sq metre

warehouse and integrated 500 sq metre office block is framed specially to keep internal columns to a minimum. The site was designed for 200 vehicle movements a day.

Marston's recently appointed a new General Manager Steve Smythe with a retained Mansfield staff of Geoff Speight Transport Manager, Brian Beebe (inset) Warehouse Manager, and Lynne Palmer and Jim Kirkham, stock controllers.

Oakham Distribution warehouse stocks allcommodities associated with the smooth running of public houses - from beer, wines and spirits to cooking oils and toilet rolls.





Once picked, the goods are loaded onto pallets for loading onto the fleet of fifteen lorries for delivery.


For the twelve satellite warehouses, including Harping Road at Hull, the goods are loaded onto double decker articulated trailers for despatch.

The office receives a trade requisition and passes the order to the warehouse team who use a computer-controlled system for placing and retrieving loads from defined storage locations using man riding pallet trucks.

The Brewery's Hull headquarters and depot at Harping Road played a key role in Mansfield's commitment in the Humberside region.


It was extensively modernised and handled all the day to day demands of administration, distribution and servicing operations.

North Country Brewery Coopers' Shop

Yesteryear the only way to transport beer was either in bottles or larger volumes by wooden Traditional barrels. barrels were made by Coopers, who shaped the staves oak. The of craftsmen then bound the staves together with metal hoops. The near finished barrel was placed over a small fire. The internal charring was cleaned off before processing the flat ends to the top or bottom of the barrel.



Various sizes were made depending of the amount of beer required:-Hogsheads (54 gal) Barrels (36gal) Kilderkin (18 gal) Firkin (9gall)
